SPEAKERS

- Changyong Choi (Republic of Korea) a Senior Researcher at National Environmental Center for Environmental Management in Seoul National University. He is a National Geographic explorer with 2017 NGS-Asia grant.
- **Emilia Lai** (Taiwan/Australia) a young Taiwanese shorebird conservationist and highly skilled field scientist based in Australia. She has worked with Chris Hassell, the leading conservationist of the East Asian-Australasian Flyway, for over the past 6 years and worked at Broome Bird Observatory for 2 years.
- Youngmin Moon (Republic of Korea) a waterbirds conservationist in the Kyunghee University. He has led the BirdLife International's Geum Estuary Project to conserve one of the most important migratory waterbirds habitats in the Flyway, as the project coordinator.
- Terry Townshend (China) a passionate conservationist with a professional background in environmental law, based in China. He has spearheaded efforts to save some of China's most threatened birds, and in 2012 he became a Species Champion with BirdLife International. His blog is extremely popular among the bird watchers and conservationists in Asia and beyond.
